Financial aid for seniors

A Financial Aid Workshop was held in the cafeteria on January 8th for seniors and their parents to offer assistance in the financial aid application process.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is a form that is available to future college students in the United States that determines their eligibility for student financial aid.

As a part of the U.S Department of Education, the office of Federal Student Aid helps make a college education possible for every student by providing more than one hundred fifty billion dollars in federal grants, loans, and work-study funds.

Mr. Ortiz, College and Career Counselor, led the meeting along with Cecilia Leiva, Regional Coordinator of the Early Academic Outreach Program at UC Irvine.

Together they discussed the importance of students filling out a FAFSA application. Mr. Ortiz said, "In the long run, it can help students pay for college. For example, if they get the Cal Grant A they can receive up to \$48,000."

Leiva also stressed the importance for students to maintain a GPA above 2.00, otherwise they won't qualify for financial aid. In order to fill out the FAFSA form, each student must apply for a Federal PIN at www.pin.ed.gov.

It is required to have your most recent federal income tax return. If your parents have not filed their taxes they can give an estimate, then update it after they file their taxes.

You will also need your social security number, and you must be a U.S citizen or resident.

All males need to complete an extra step before applying for their Financial Aid. It is law for males to enlist in the army if they plan to apply for financial aid.

FAFSA is a great opportunity for students to receive free money. All students are encouraged to not turn down this opportunity.

There will be another financial aid workshop held in the library on February 1st. Leiva will be attending as well and will be helping students and parents fill out the applications.

If you are a college ready student, be sure to apply at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Students must have their FAFSA completed by March 2nd, but make sure to check if any colleges that you applied to have earlier deadlines. Do not turn down this opportunity for free money!

Gadabouts return from winter trip

After traveling through six countries in 12 days over winter break, the El Rancho Gadabouts travel club has returned from Europe. The Gadabouts Club, headed by Mrs. Charissa Zeko and Mr. Paul Zeko, visited Austria, the Czech Republic, Germany, Hungary, Poland, and Slovakia.

The journey, led by Franziska, the Zekos' favorite tour guide, began in Berlin, Germany and ended in Vienna, Austria. The Gadabouts visited historic sites like Auschwitz, the Berlin Wall, Dresden, Potsdam, St. Stephen's Cathedral, and St. Mary's Basilica. After certain tours, the travelers were even given up to five and a half hours of free time to roam the cities in small groups.

The Gadabouts group this year was relatively small, with only 29 travelers, three of which were adults.

Mrs. Zeko's favorite event on the trip was "the unplanned tire-changing stop, where everyone settled into the authentic Czech house-style restaurant, and spent time getting to know each other."

Franziska, the trip tour guide, said, "Seeing the Old Town Square in Prague all lit up, with a giant Christmas tree right in front of the Gothic Tyn Church when we got there was definitely a highlight. Some of the students also went ice skating in Budapest with me and the Zekos... Seeing

the students skating in this beautiful setting at dusk, some of them on ice for the very first time, cannot be topped in my opinion."

Franziska stressed the importance of travelling by saying, "Traveling opens your eyes, mind and horizon. Every single student will be (a little) different at the end of a trip like ours. You learn about other cultures, traditions and history." Mrs. Zeko added to this by quoting St. Augustine: "The world is a book and those who do not travel read only one page."

El Rancho students seemed to be most impressed with the beauty of the countries. Senior traveler Justin Raya said, "It's

pretty and the people are very kind." Senior traveler Jesse Sanchez said, "While the impact of both World War II and the Cold War can still be seen behind Churchill's Iron Curtain, all of the countries we visited were breathtakingly beautiful and their people inspiring."

Each student's experience was unique. Senior Gadabout Susan Aparicio said, "I think the trip was only as fun as the people you were around." She also said, "It was great to see the history of the countries in real life, instead of in textbooks."

Aparicio said there was a lunch stop in Slovakia every-

one enjoyed. "The stop in Slovakia was really fun since it was the only country where we were able to play in the snow."

The catchphrase of the trip, coined by Raya, became "Oh! Jesus is testing me!" Raya said the line one night when Franziska told him that the group's walk to their dinner restaurant would involve hills.

The Gadabouts' next trip in the summer of 2015 takes them to Italy, Greece, and Turkey. Dons, there is always room for one more and Franziska says, "the more, the merrier," so make sure to sign up for the next trip in room B-105 with Mrs. Zeko.

Chinese students make annual visit to El Rancho

The Chinese students from the Experimental High School attached to Beijing Normal University in Beijing, China show an eagerness to learn about American culture and our education system. After an interview process, El Rancho families are allowed to host the visiting students. The Chinese students then shadow El Rancho students with common interests.

Holly and Pu Yiwei, who attended classes with Karla Boche, said they look forward to gaining "more knowledge and observing a different culture while communicating with students about some differences between Chinese education and American education."

Mrs. Senteno-Tapia has taught them about our school using a scavenger hunt. The students will learn art with Mrs. Leal and culinary skills with Chef Luna. The rest of the insight exchange students get will come from teachers and staff that host the students. Pu Yiwei pointed out that in Chinese schools, all students have the same class and stay in the same classroom all day. Yiwei said she liked "the way the American students can choose classes and go to different classrooms."

Boche said the experience of navigating Yiwei is "quite fine, quite fine indeed." Although some of Boche's classes have been somewhat uneventful, taking Yiwei and Holly to her band class was fun because she "showed them some instruments,

[they] played music together, and [she] was able to talk to them."

Boche says she learned about the difference in Chinese student life. "Some of [the students] live on campus in special dorms that they can house in." Some students in China attend school for about nine hours.

Mrs. Kwek, El Rancho High School principal, said she is proud that "everyone has welcomed our visitors. It has been great." She says, "I hope that we [El Rancho students] have the chance to learn about each other's customs and we can gain an appreciation for other cultures."

The Chinese students will be having their own talent show here at El Rancho after school in the cafeteria. Be sure to stop by and support them.





want to go too far from home; Azusa Pacific University is a small private school less than 30 minutes away from Pico Rivera. APU has a 52% acceptance rate and

the deadline to apply is June 1st.

There are many ways to remain entertained at APU, whether it is by attending the sporting events, watching a movie at the

movie theater down the street, or grabbing a bite at Chick-Fil-A across the campus. APU also has sporting events which includes baseball, basketball, football, soccer, and more. Students also have the opportunity to play in intramural sports such as dodge ball.

If sports are not what you are looking forward to while attending college, there are also many clubs/organizations to choose from at APU. There are multi-ethnic organizations along with social, service, academic, and athletic clubs.

The estimated tuition for the 2013-2014 school year was \$39,946 which included tuition, university service fee, health fee, housing, and a meal plan.

APU also offers work study as an option of financial aid. There are job openings around the campus, for example in their cafes, and many food places across the street from the campus need workers.

The workload at APU is said to be manageable. The student to faculty ratio is 13:1 which is good considering that there are about 30 students per class in high school. Popular majors at APU include Nursing and Business Administration and Office.

It is not too late for seniors to apply to APU and it is not too early for the underclassmen to begin looking into colleges. APU is a great place to attend if you love the outdoors and plan to attend a small school.

This November, Pico Rivera had its city election for mayor, where three men were running for two open spots on the council. Two candidates are current council members, Gustavo V. Camacho and David W. Armenta, and the last candidate was Adrian Diaz, a Pico water district board member.

In the end, Gustavo V. Camacho won with a total of 2,703 votes. David W. Armenta came in a close second with a total of 1,863 votes. Adrian Diaz did not get a spot on the council and came up with a total of 1,390 votes.

Gustavo V. Camacho and David W. Armenta want our city to keep the reputation of being a business-friendly city and would love for more businesses to come into our community.

Bringing new businesses not only makes our city a

out every team that they played.


