In response to a mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida on February 14th where seventeen people were killed and seventeen were injured, students from El Rancho and students from hundreds of schools across the country participated in the #NationalWalkoutDay on March 14th.

Even though El Rancho was scheduled for a lock down drill at 9:45 a.m., students remained determined to walk out and show their support. The lock down drill ended just a few minutes before the national walkout was scheduled.

Students walked out at 10 a.m. in support of gun control and in memory of the seventeen Stoneman Douglas High School students and staff mem-

bers who were killed during the campus shooting. About 200 students walked out for a duration of seventeen minutes, one minute for each student killed.

Senior Evelin Salas spoke out during the event, saying, “We are not willing to wait for another innocent life to be taken because someone had easy access to a gun. We shouldn’t have to feel scared about not making it back home. We want a

solution and we want it now.”

“I know that many people see our movement as a waste of time, but I believe that through unification we can achieve great things,” said junior Jesus Delgado. “We, the youth, are the future of this world, and if we want things to change, we must take action.”

Across the nation, hundreds of students attending Baltimore Polytechnic Institute walked out and showed their support by laying down and staying silent for 17 minutes and students attending Mount Diablo High School broke through locked gates in protest.

The Rio Hondo College Sociology class will be hosting a march/rally in support of gun control on Saturday, March 24th at the parking lot across El Rancho. Originally started by @AMarch4OurLives on Twitter, the event will be from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. but arrive 15 minutes earlier for check-in.

During the event, the following workshops will be held: poster making (begins at 9 a.m.), voter registration (Social Security Number and government issued ID needed), and letter writing to Congress and to the families in Florida who were affected by the school shooting. 

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
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

The WASC Committee’s purpose is to visit schools and colleges around the nation and evaluate them to see if they are considered “credible.” Schools that are credited are viewed as reliable with the quality of their outcomes as opposed to schools that are not.

On the day that WASC arrived ASB, band, student volunteers, and staff welcomed the committee with open arms. After the welcoming, volun-

teers gave a tour of the campus and showcased numerous programs that the school possesses.

For the next two days, WASC members walked through the campus and in and out of multiple classes. While on duty, the committee members asked students questions about the school, evaluated teaching, and noted things they liked and disliked about the campus.

To minimize the mark-downs and maximize the positives, students were asked to behave, while teachers was cautioned to stay away from lectures and tests and instead incorporate activities that they would hold in their classroom.

The last WASC visit was

held three years ago. Vice Principal Mrs. Chavez Diaz, was told by the committee that “[We] did not do [ourselves] justice. [We] did not brag. [We] did not really represent everything [we’re] doing.”

Fortunately, El Rancho has stepped up their game since then. Chavez Diaz went on to say that, “this year they came in and said our Culinary Arts program is amazing and that our band was amazing.”

Still, a good report isn’t the only outcome of the visit. The WASC visit itself is a reminder and a learning moment for staff. AP Calculus teacher Mr. Francis said, “[The visit] does make me reflect and take into account that I’m making sure to meet the needs of everybody in my classroom.”

Remembering Stephen Hawking

The well known theoretical physicist Stephen Hawking passed away on March 14th at the age of 76. According to his family, Hawking was said to have died peacefully in his home located in Cambridge, England.

Hawking was iconic for multiple reasons. He contributed theorems to the theory of general relativity, he had discovered more about black holes and their functions, and he was also the author of numerous best selling novels such as *The Theory of Everything* and most widely known, *A Brief History of Time*.

Hawking's life began in Oxford, United Kingdom on January 8th, 1942. As he grew up Hawking did not believe himself to be in the best place academically. However, this changed with the years leading up to his college education. Near his time of entering college Hawking found himself to be intrigued by mathematics, only to later develop a passion for it.

At the age of 21, Hawking was diagnosed with a motor neuron disease titled amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, otherwise known as ALS. After his diagnosis, the future scientist became discouraged and had lost all motivation to continue with his studies. Being unmotivated to work, Hawking had pushed through his depression and regained his passion and goal to finish his studies.

Hawking would live on to contribute ground-breaking work to singularities. He would then coccidiosis four laws of Black Holes. Hawking's most famous accomplishment in science is disproving the idea that nothing could escape black holes. Hawking countered this theory by proving that black holes emit radiation.

Even though he was an iconic scientist and diagnosed with a fatal disease, Hawking was not an overly-serious man. When interviewed Hawking's daughter Lucy Hawking gave comments on her father's personality. Lucy would go to say that Hawking was "an extremely stubborn" man and even to have a great sense of humor.

Given two years to live, Hawking had miraculously pushed through for more than 50 years with his condition and both posed and answered questions that will forever be influential to humanity and it's survival.

Take a journey to Hope World in in J-hope's "Hixtape"

It's J-hope's world, we're just living in it. On March 2nd, 2018, BTS member Jung Hoseok aka J-hope released his highly anticipated "hixtape" entitled *Hope World*.

The mixtape instantly soared to number one on iTunes in over 63 different countries, including Canada, Brazil, England, and the United States. Shortly the week after, the mixtape rose to #63 on Billboard 200 chart making him the highest entry for a Korean Solo artist on both charts.

Even though the mixtape quickly received positive responses and gathered many accomplishments, the production of the mixtape was not always easy. The mixtape took over 3 years to make and has been a long process but J-hope has always endured the tough time-commit-

ment with patience and positivity.

"My fantasy had always been making a music video and performing with music that I had created," said J-hope in a recent interview, "I also wanted to put my own story to music and share it with the world."

The 7-tracked mixtape is passionately articulated through a vibrant tone of music as J-hope soundtracks his most cherishable moments and ambitions from being a young street-dancer to international K-Pop star.

"[BTS members] RM and SUGA releasing their own mixtapes was the motivation for my own project" says J-hope, "I have been and continue to be deeply influenced by them, from the day we began to where we are today."

The self-representation of J-hope's life is evident from the beginning as the mixtape opens with it's self-titled "Hope World," which J-hope describes his "first business card

The film, in itself, is a bit of a disorganized story. Just when you think you've understood what's going on, the movie will throw you a curveball. *A Wrinkle in Time* seems to lack a good flow and it's pacing is rather odd, but its visuals make up for it.

The main goal of the group is to find Murry's father, but the interstellar travel is what makes the journey worthwhile. The scenery is very CGI based, but it truly brings everything life. Not only did DuVernay put together an almost all person of color main cast, she also tackled issues that we don't see very often in film and media. In the film, Meg has a love/hate relation-

ship with her hair and that's what makes her character one of the most relatable in the entire film. Her struggle to fit in and love herself for who she is really stands out in the film. Murry is also bullied by Veronica (Rowan Blanchard), a classmate of hers. We later find out that the bully has issues too. Veronica actually suffers from an eating disorder and has body image issues of her own as well.

These topics are hard to discuss especially in a movie that is aimed at a younger audience, but DuVernay and the cast do a wonderful job of putting that on the big screen. The film, after all, is all about love. Whether it was a daughter's love for her father or a girl's love for herself, that didn't matter, the main idea that is supposed to be taken away from this film is that love, no matter what kind, always defeats the evil.

If you're thinking about watching *A Wrinkle in Time*, keep this in mind: DuVernay's adaptation of the film vaguely resembles the novel, so if you're looking for an exact and accurate version of L'Engle's story, you're going to be disappointed. If you just want to watch an adaptation of a classic novel you might have read as a child, then *A Wrinkle in Time* is the right movie for you.

as he reminisces about his dream to fly an airplane as a child.


Finally, *Hope World* ends strong with "Blue Side (Outro)" in which he describes as him "melting into a song."
